講義概要/Course description

This introductory course is designed to introduce students to the basic concepts, theoretical approaches and enduring questions of political science. It helps students understand key concepts, such as power, authority, ideology, the state, legitimacy, democracy, and nationalism, among others, necessary to understand modern politics in historical context. The course is divided into two parts. The first part introduces different approaches to political analysis, major ideological traditions, the role of the state in politics, the nature of legitimacy, contrasting models of democracy, the significance of nationalism and national identity as



well as the reshaping of many of these by globalizing forces. The second part highlights the dynamics of the interaction between politics and other spheres of social life, such as the economy, civil society, and popular culture, with a focus on the mechanisms through which societal pressures are channeled into political action. Weekly reading assignments and a midterm and final exam require students to spend about 120 minutes preparing for class each week.

The goals of the course are as follows:

- ① To help students understand the key concepts and theoretical approaches in the study of politics.
- ^② To provide students with an understanding of the relationship between politics and other aspects of society.
- ③ To prepare students for further study in the field of political science.

Political Science I (政治学原論 I) is part of a two-semester introduction to political science together with Political Science II (政治学原論 II). Two versions of this class, one taught in English and one taught in Japanese, are available. Similarly, if you have already taken one semester of this class taught in Japanese and received credit, you must also take the remaining semester in Japanese.
