Course Objectives	Basic introduction to European art history from Antiquity to Post Modernism. How are social values, norms and historical context reflected in Western visual arts? Students will deepen their understanding of Western culture, society, history and their manifestations in paintings, drawings, sculptures and installations. The course offers a combination of theoretical, aesthetical and historical perspectives on art as well as hands—on experiences for students. Students will independently research and present an art historical theme in class.  English language knowledge is required								
Course Description	This course will focus on selected topics in Western art history and how visual art responds to society and historic events. Periods from Greek and Roman Antiquity, Medieval times and Renaissance, Baroque, Romanticism, Impressionism, Expressionism, 20th Century Modernism, Post Modernism and Contemporary will be covered. The class will include lectures, demonstrations, art activities and student presentations as well as drawing exercises.
