You will also engage with drawing as a means of creative expression, and a tool of imagination and enquiry relevant to diverse contemporary practices.

MATERIALS LIST FOR STUDENTS

For Assessment Task 1 you should have a basic drawing kit ready for use (please confer with your lecturer about specific daily requirements, as there may be variation between classes regarding activities and instructions to use particular media):

- A2 and A1 cartridge paper;
- Coloured Pencils; Graphite Pencils in HB, 2B, and/or 4B;
- Charcoal Pencil in a B, 2B, 3B, or 4B, also marketed as hard, medium, and soft;
- Willow or Vine Charcoal (sometimes called natural charcoal) in thin, medium, and thick sized sticks;
- Compressed Charcoal (a stick of 2B, 3B, or 4B);
- Kneadable Eraser; Plastic Eraser;
- General Stationery: ruler, pencil sharpener, blade, scissors, masking tape;
- Fixative Spray;
- FOLDER for drawings.

For Assessment Task 2 you will also need:

- 1 x sheet A2–A1 white or off-white/cream drawing or watercolour paper (hot or cold pressed, approx. 300gsm, the size of the paper may vary depending on the brand—Arches, Millford, Bockingford, etc.);
- Sheets of Canson 'Mi-Teintes' Paper 160gsm, 55 x 75 cm, one sheet each from the following range of colours to give you a mix of warm/cool/light/mid tones: CREAMS (Lily, Ivory, Eggshell, Oyster, Cream); LIGHT COLOURS (Flannel Grey, Pearl Grey, Sky Grey, Hemp, Canary); MID TONES (Pearl, Felt Grey, Steel Grey, Light Blue, Light Green);
- Pigment Drawing Ink (Black, Sepia, Burnt Sienna or similar);
- Soft Pastels, a box of 24, 32, 36, or 48 (e.g. 'Mungyo' Soft Pastels, box of 32, ½-length sticks). Do not purchase a pack of 12 pastels as the colour range is too limited; DO NOT PURCHASE OIL

PASTELS;

- Pastel Pencils may be used to complement soft pastels, however, they can be expensive so are recommended rather than a requirement;
- 2–4 Flat and Pointed Brushes and/or Chinese calligraphy brushes of different sizes (it may be cost effective to purchase a small set, e.g. Golden Nylon Brush Set of 6);
- Watercolour Palette, Water Container;
- Fixative Spray;
- Paper Towel/Tissues for cleaning hands;
- Miscellaneous paper for testing/blending colours or protecting dry-pigment drawings;
- Optional: Paper Stump, also known as a Tortillon, for blending charcoal and pastel.

For Assessment Task 3 you will be required to draw with A4 or A3 paper of various types, and other traditional and alternative/experimental art materials not listed here; many of these will be low or no cost.
