<p>This module will allow the student to respond to their experience of being in London through their writing. Seminars on essential aspects of creative writing (setting, point of view, character, structure, etc.) are led by a professional writer and organised by workshops. The module will also include site visits to relevant areas in London.</p>		

### Learning outcomes

By the end of the module the successful student will be able to:

- recognise and describe some of the main features of living in contemporary London and illustrate some of these aspects through the medium of creative writing;
- show through their creative practice the ability to use and control character, plot, narrative, tone, point of view, voice, mood, tense, description, detail, dialogue, audiences, irony etc. as appropriate to the genre they are working with;
- illustrate the capacity to reflect critically (including historically, contextually, and stylistically) on their own written productions in response to being in London;

- demonstrate a knowledge of drafting (and redrafting) as part of the process of textual production;
- indicate through group discussion of both their work and that of other students, that they can offer and respond with useful and constructive criticism;

### Indicative syllabus content

Through a series of targeted readings and writing exercises, the module will analyse the following topics on a weekly basis: setting, structure, character, point of view, conflict, detail, register and subtexts.

### Assessment rationale

The portfolio directly assesses the student's engagement with the module materials and ability to apply techniques learnt on the module. The reflective blog assesses the student's ability to keep a regular writing regime, and the depth of their engagement with their readings on/ experiences of the city. The emphasis on regular publication of the blog entries assesses the student's ability to write and edit finished pieces and manage submission deadlines. Continuous assessment will monitor the student's response to the workshops and the effective transference of skills learned therein to the final submission. It also tests the student's ability to understand key concepts from the course as well as the development of the principal skills necessary for producing a successful piece of writing.

### Assessment criteria

The module grade will be determined by:

- Evident focus on London in their written work (portfolio)
- Appropriate use of creative writing techniques such as setting, point of view, plot, etc. (portfolio)
- Evidence of redrafting and editing following feedback (portfolio)
- Regularity of entries (blog)
- Reflection on class materials, readings and exercises (blog)
- Engaged attendance and proactive participation in workshops and group critiques (continuous assessment)
