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Section 2 Goals and Objectives

1. Course Goals

This course will provide an overview of the dimensions and characteristics of global NGO's activities with some focus on Asia and Thailand as a part of the students' domain. It examines the nature of human, basic needs and how some of these can be satisfied by the NGOs' activities.
