Course Description:

Personality psychology is the study of the whole person in their social and cultural context. Personality psychologists seek to explain the origin of human universals and to understand how and why people differ from each other. The primary aim of this course is to offer an introduction to the study of personality by surveying the major theoretical approaches to personality in addition to the latest findings from contemporary research. Prerequisites must be completed prior to enrolling in this course. It is the students' responsibility to ensure these requirements have been fulfilled. Assumed Background:

Normally, students in 2016PSY will be undertaking their second or third year of study in one of the programs provided by the School of Applied Psychology. However, students in their second or third year of other programs are likely to be able to successfully complete 2016PSY provided they have equivalent levels of knowledge and skill to those outlined in the prerequisites. An understanding of fundamental statistics including correlation is key to success in this course. Please note the prerequisite courses listed in the Course Description above - students are required to have successfully passed these courses (or equivalents) in order to enrol in this course.

1.2 Course Introduction

Topics within the field of personality and individual differences continue to expand, making this an exciting and rapidly developing field within psychology. Recent research has established that personality is crucially important for education, work, health, and life outcomes generally. This course provides a broad foundation in relevant research methods and findings, while helping students to develop their own understanding of personality. This course profile outlines the essential components of the course, which is run at both the Gold Coast and Mt Gravatt campuses.

Previous Student Feedback

Students found the course to be well-organised, interesting and engaging. Students appreciated that the content was designed by those with expertise in the area of personality psychology. Students enjoyed using their personality scores calculated during tutorials and how personality can be applied to behaviour. In 2022 this course will run in blended mode to allow greater integration of active learning experiences.
