An exploration of contemporary security challenges and the changing nature of armed conflict in the contemporary world; global contexts of armed conflict; inter-, intra- and extra-state conflicts; discussion and assessment of typologies and trends of armed conflict on the international level; the application of theoretical concepts to case studies in comparative perspective.

2. Objectives of Course Development / Revision

2.1 Course Objectives

Students will better understand the changing nature of security challenges in the contemporary world. They will explore typologies and historical trends of conflict and violence; global frameworks of contemporary armed conflict; security challenges in the international world order; and interdisciplinary theoretical frameworks to analyze them. Through case studies, students will understand, analyze and examine security challenges and armed conflict in a global comparative perspective.
