The Culture of Eastern Orthodoxy: From Constantinople to Eurasia

1. Course Description

This course-trip will combine pre-assigned readings with visits to museums, galleries, and concerts in Istanbul, Türkiye, to explore the role of Byzantine Orthodoxy in forming the cultural and historical space of Western Eurasia from Anatolia and the Balkans to Russia and Eastern Europe. The students will read the assigned materials before departure. The group will be together for 12 hours each day visiting sites and contextualizing everything it encounters in the readings.

2. Format and Learning Objectives

This course is a mix of professor-led tours and discussions upon which all students will be graded. I expect active participation from you during discussions. Feel free to ask questions about the sites and debate with each other. Do not sit in silence because it will bring your grade down. The History Department Learning Outcomes are below:

- 1. Historical Literacy: Students will gain an understanding of the scope, breadth, and richness of historical studies.
- 2. Critical Thinking: Students will learn to apply historical methods to critically evaluate the record of the past, and how historians and others have interpreted it.
- 3. Public History Engagement Skills: Students will acquire basic insights into museum and cultural site construction and interpretation.
- 4. Communication Skills: Students will learn to organize and express their thoughts clearly and coherently, both in writing and orally.
- 5. Writing & Intellectual Skills: Students will demonstrate their mastery of the knowledge and skills involved in historical practice by conceptualizing and executing a reaction paper.

3. Office Hours

American University places a premium on student-instructor interaction and encourages the development of intellectual relationships that lead to self-discovery. I cordially invite you to visit my office before departure or to speak via Zoom. You will also be able to speak to me at any time during the trip.

4. Readings

We will read the following texts, which will be integral parts of the course. We will discuss them in class on a regular basis, and you will be graded on participating in these discussions.

5. Requirements and Grading

A. Quizzes

There will be no test for this course.

B. Attendance

Due to the unique format of this course, attendance will, of course, be mandatory throughout the trip.

C. Writing

All student taking the course for credit will write a 10,000-word essay exploring three museums or cultural sites of their choosing in the context of the assigned historical reading for the course. The focus will be the Byzantine cultural and religious tradition and its change over time as seen through the prism of these three sites. The papers will be due two weeks after the trip is over—by 5 pm on Tuesday, January 9, 2024.

D. Grading

You will be graded on your participation in the daily seminars and your final paper. The discussions will be worth 60% and the paper 40% of your grade. To pass the course, students will have to maintain a consistently high level of participation.

6. Honor Code

All students are required to abide by the University Honor Code. Plagiarism, cheating, and other forms of academic dishonesty will not be tolerated and will be reported immediately to the appropriate authorities.
