Section 2 Aims and Objectives

1. Course Goals

To provide students with an overview understanding of various types of transnational crimes and criminal net-works; to understand transnational mechanisms and institutions for interdiction and law enforcement; to help students distinguish between long term crime prevention measures, such as education and more coercive ap-proaches involving security and police personnel.

2.1 Course Objectives

Students will better understand the scope and consequences of transnational crime. They will also learn about existing interstate institutions and efforts to combat transnational crime. Case study work will help the students understand how transnational criminal networks are investigated and interdicted.

1. Course Description

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Convention, money laundering, corruption, human trafficking, counterfeiting, drug trafficking, cybercrime. The course also describes International cooperative efforts to combatting these crimes, including INTERPOL and extradition.
