[COURSE INFORMATION]

The course will address the history, current state, and future of North Korea, essential to understanding its human rights and human security situation. The students will learn skills and techniques essential to being successful as an entry level professional in human rights, development, or humanitarian issues. The course will help students comprehend the vast oppressive apparatus employed to execute North Korea's policy of human rights denial and to maintain the status quo. Students will learn about the applicable international legal framework, and the available remedies embedded in relevant provisions. Students will become familiar with the methodology employed by human rights organizations dealing with North Korea, including the execution, processing, and analysis of interviews with North Korean defectors and other witnesses, and their corroboration with satellite imagery and other available relevant data. The students will acquire a firm understanding of the structure and functions of both the UN system and international civil society. The students will become familiar with ROK-U.S.-Japan trilateral coordination on North Korean security, military, human rights and humanitarian issues within both a bilateral and a multilateral context. The students will explore the difficulties encountered when attempting to negotiate with North Korea as well as the history of diplomatic interaction with that country. Guest speakers will include North Korean

escapees and former top negotiators with North Korea.



PREREQUISITE	Academic curiosity and a strong interest in learning about international human rights standards, the concepts of both traditional Westphalian security and human security and their application, the human rights-security nexus, humanitarian assistance, and Korean peninsula issues.		
COURSE REQUIREME	Virtual attendance is mandatory; unavoidable absences must be cleared in advance with the course instructor. All students are expected to participate actively in the virtual class discussion. All course materials will be made available. Finally, all students are expected to complete their reading and research assignments.

	Different portions of the assigned reading material will be assigned to several students per session. The students will take turns presenting the assigned segments of the reading material. This will be an ongoing team activity, whose purpose is to cover a lot of material throughout the duration of the course, and to help build the camaraderie and team spirit essential to the successful operation of human rights and humanitarian NGOs.

Greg Scarlatoiu is the Executive Director of the Committee for Human Rights in North Korea (HRNK). He has coordinated the publication of 52 HRNK reports. Scarlatoiu conducts U.S. Congressional and UN outreach. He led and spearheaded the campaign that earned HRNK UN ECOSOC consultative status in April 2018. Prior to teaching at Yonsei University, he was a visiting professor at Hankuk University of Foreign Studies for seven years. For 14 years, he has been instructor and coordinator of the Korean Peninsula and Japan class at the U.S. State Department's Foreign Service Institute (FSI). Scarlatoiu is president of the International Council on Korean Studies (ICKS). For the past 21 years, he has authored and broadcast the Korean language "Scarlatoiu Column" for Radio Free Asia (RFA). His experience includes 3 years with Korea Economic Institute in Washington, D.C. and over 6 years in international development. Scarlatoiu holds a Master of Arts in Law and Diplomacy from the Fletcher School, Tufts University, and a Master of Arts and Bachelor of Arts from Seoul National University's Department of International Relations. He completed the MIT XXI Seminar for U.S. national security leaders in 2016-2017. The Global Peace Foundation honored Scarlatoiu's contributions to the cause of North Korean human rights with the Freedom of Conscience and Religion Award in December 2023. The Korean Informational Association Inc., Washington granted Scarlatoiu the Korea Unification Contribution Award in December 2022. Scarlatoiu was awarded the title Citizen of Honor, City of Seoul, in January 1999. In 2018, he was also awarded the title of Citizen of Honor by the mayor of Buzau, his Romanian hometown. Born and raised in communist Romania, Scarlatoiu is a naturalized

U.S. citizen. He is fluent in Korean and French and a native Romanian speaker.
