Prerequisites:	Knowledge of German at the required level (except for complete beginners). Entry level of students is ascertained by means of self-assessment and information from students and a placement test when necessary.				
Usability in other modules / programmes:	German courses at higher levels				
Module structure:	German at all levels of the Common European Framework of Reference and its Companion Volume from beginners (target level A1) to C1. Two courses are required to proceed from one level to the next.				
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Brief description and aim of the module:	The module aims to provide students with the communicative competences necessary for success in everyday contexts as well as, at higher levels, academic and business contexts. Depending on the level, this can range from basic oral and written competence to presentation and discussion skills. The enabling knowledge of grammar and vocabulary will be trained and, at higher levels, will include complex forms.				
Intended learning outcomes:	The aim of the module German as a Foreign Language is to provide students with effective communication skills in language in German, both for their university and private life in Germany as well as for their further academic career and possibly work or internship in a German-speaking environment. The learning outcome depends on the starting level and will range from levels A1 to C1 (CEFR and Companion Volume, Council of Europe 2001 and 2020). The focus is on oral competence and spoken communication, including mediation and plurilingual/pluricultural competence. This may mean that the students can communicate in basic international and intercultural contexts but may extend to expressing themselves fluently and spontaneously without much				

	obvious searching for expressions. At the end of the module students should be able to use language effectively at the relevant level for social, academic and professional purposes.
