3 Semester Credits

1. DESCRIPTION

This introductory language course is intended for students with no prior knowledge of Italian. The course presents linguistic fundamentals and essential grammatical structures necessary for elementary communication. Students will learn the regular conjugations of common -are, -ere, and -ire verbs, working primarily with present tense verbs. Simple prepositions will also be introduced along with other fundamental structures.

2. OBJECTIVES

During the course emphasis will be given to all four abilities to be developed while learning a language: listening, speaking, reading, and writing. Students will be guided in the establishment of pronunciation and communication skills both in and outside class, and assisted in familiarizing themselves with the Italian language and cultural environment in which they are immersed. In addition to the acquisition of basic communicative skills, students will also be required to complete written exercises, and assignments to strengthen grammatical structures and vocabulary.

Grammar:

Acquiring the basic structures of the language.

Simple grammatical structures and sentence patterns.

Vocabulary:

Understanding and using basic vocabulary regarding the concepts of space, time, quantity and quality.

Mastering the basic vocabulary necessary for the most common and concrete communicative situations.

Listening:

Understanding the most commonly used expressions in daily verbal communication, such as simple information and very brief dialogues, instructions addressed carefully and slowly.

Speaking:

Using the most common colloquial expressions in daily social communication for self- identification, greetings, asking for and giving basic information.

Using the language in order to identify and describe surroundings (in limited terms).

Reading:

Understanding simple texts for practical use.

Writing:

Writing simple texts.

3. REQUIREMENTS

There are no prerequisites for this course.

4. METHOD

This course consists of lectures, class discussions, projects. Mediums for instruction used will include, but are not limited to, interactive and hands-on activities which challenge thought processes, academic texts and studies, videos, slides, guided problem solving, and experiential and/or field learning activities where applicable.

10. ATTENDANCE - PARTICIPATION

Overall effort, cooperation during group work, proper care of work space and tools, responsible behavior, and completion of assignments will be assessed. 11. EXAMS - PAPERS - PROJECTS

Two quizzes will account for a total of 20% of the final course grade. For time and date refer to course website. The time and date of the exam cannot be changed for any reason. Format:

Quizzes are cumulative and will be based on grammar topics presented in class from the beginning of the session.

The number of points given for each exercise will be clearly stated at the top of the exercise itself. Time will be clearly stated at the top of the test.

The **Midterm** and **Final** exams each account for 20% of the final course grade. For exam time and date refer to course website. The time and date of the exam cannot be changed for any reason. Format: Exams are cumulative and will be based on grammar topics presented in class from the beginning of the session and will test all four abilities (Listening, Reading, Writing, Speaking).

Exams may include multiple choice questions, fill-in the blanks, vocabulary exercises, reading with true/false replies, a listening comprehension, and an essential writing exercise.

The number of points given for each exercise will be clearly stated at the top of the exercise itself

The **Oral Presentation** accounts for 10% of the course grade. Topic, length, guidelines, and due date will be provided on course website.

Vocabulary knowledge and appropriate usage, comprehensibility, pronunciation, content (not reading from notes), ability to answer instructor/classmates and questions during class and completion of all tasks assigned will be assessed.
