Course Objective

The student:

- 1. obtains knowledge of the major historical developments in
- analytic philosophy in the first half of the 20th century
- 2. can describe the major contributions of the most important
- philosophers in this tradition
- 3. can read primary texts in analytic philosophy
- 4. understands and is able to use some of the logical formalism used in

philosophical analysis

Course Content

Since the beginning of the 20th century, a new tradition in philosophy has emerged, which became known as analytic philosophy. This tradition is variously characterized by its conceptual rigor, tight argumentation, logical formalization, appeals to common sense, and (as the name suggests) attention for analysis. We will study the early development of this tradition in the first half of the 20th century. A historical overview of the major developments will be given, and we will read read primary texts by Frege, Russell, Moore, Wittgenstein, and Stebbing.

Additional Information Teaching Methods

The course consists in discussions of some primary texts as well as discussions of chapters from the main book by M. Beaney. Students work in groups on the textual material, and then discuss their results with other groups and the lecturer. There are also short expository lectures to introduce the text to be read in the next class.

Method of Assessment

Exam (75% of the final grade, assessment of learning objectives 1, 2, 3 and 4)
Class participation (25% of the final grade, assessment of learning objectives 1 and 3)
