Course Objective

At the end of this course, students are expected to:

- 1. Know and recognize historical urban patterns, developments in landscape architecture and their meanings.
- 2. Identify the relation between urban patterns, landscape architecture and architectural monuments.
- 3. Read plans of cities, landscape architecture and architectural monuments.
- 4. Make a visual and spatial analysis.
- 5. Compare historical developments in urbanism and landscape architecture and relate them to social, political and religious ideas.
- 6. Have written an essay (1700-2000 words) of academic structure and level, following a specific stylesheet (VU Department of Art and Culture).

Course Content

In this course students learn the history and meaning (social, political, religious) of patterns and elements of urban development and planning, and of landscape architecture. The examples that will be discussed cover the entire world and go back until the first millennium BC.

Additional Information Teaching Methods

Lectures and seminars. The lectures and seminars of this course are offered in English. Students following the Dutch (i.e. bilingual) track can submit all written assignments in either English or Dutch. Exceptions are multiplechoice tests, assignments with peer reviewers across language tracks, and group assignments (across language tracks)

Method of Assessment

Tuition form, type and weight of assessment: During the course the student completes three assignments. Learning goals 1, 2 and 5: Assignment 2 (Multiple Choice Exam, 50%). Learning goals 1, 3, 4, 5 and 6: Assignment (1 and) 3 (Essay, 50%). Assignments cannot compensate one another: to pass the course both the exam and the essay need to have been graded min. 5.5.
