Course Objective

After finishing this course, the student:

- can read and write simple sentences in Greek (1);
- have a prompt knowledge of the grammar sections covered in the course (mostly morphology and basic syntax) and of the basics of Koinē Greek (2);
- can recognise and explain the grammatical elements in simple sentences of the New Testament (3);
- have the competences to translate simple sentences from the New Testament into current English (4).

Course Content

In this course, students lay an important foundation for the independent study of the original language of the New Testament and of Early Christian, Jewish-Greek, and Greco-Roman sources that will be studied later in the curriculum. Students learn Koinē Greek through attendance of the tutorials, though discussing and correcting assignments together in the class, and through self-study. Students will acquire a basic knowledge of phonology, morphology, syntax, and semantics that will enable them to independently read, write, understand, analyse, and translate simple sentences in Koinē Greek.

Additional Information Teaching Methods

Lectures/tutorials, practice assignments, self-study.

Method of Assessment

Assignments and active participation in the class: 40%

Final exam: 60%

The instructor will systematically check and correct the students' assignments. Assignments and active participation in the class count for 40% of the final grade. Reading and writing (objective 1) will be tested through participation in the class and assignments. In the final, written exam the rest of the learning objectives will be tested (grammar, application of grammar, analysis, translation from Greek into English). The final exam count for 60% of the final grade.

Additional Information

Considered the intensive nature of the study of Greek, the numerous tips and explanations provided by the teacher, and the amount of exercise and reading aloud that will be done together during the course, attendance is <u>mandatory</u>. Attendance of 80% of the classes is necessary to take the final exam. Students must notify the teacher in case they will be absent for sickness or urgent matters.

Recommended background knowledge

No knowledge of Greek is assumed. However, students who do not have knowledge of basic linguistic analysis will have to bring it up to standard mostly through self-study.
