Course Objective

After finishing this course, the student:

- has acquired knowledge of the Hindu worldview;
- has gained insight in the way the Hindu worldview influences Hindu rituals, festivals, spirituality and soteriology;
- has gained insight into the workings of the sociological model of Hinduism;
- has gained a basic comfort level in engaging with contemporary issues involving Hindu context.

Course Content

The course comprises the following themes:

- Overview of Hindu philosophy, worldview
- Hindu view of existence: universe, self, divinity, concept of dharma, advaita, sacred social orders, gods and goddesses
- Hindu view of the origins/ creation
- Introduction to Hindu epistemology: Hindu Scriptures, Importance of living lineages and oral traditions
- Hindu view of ethics, values, purity & impurity, doctrine of karma
- Hindu ways of life: calendar, rituals, festivals, private and public forms of devotion
- Hindu soteriology, advaita, renunciation, spirituality, cycles of birth and death
- Hinduism's interaction with other contemporary world, modernity

The pedagogy used is a combination of reading texts, interpretation of text, videos, group discussions and experiential practices. The course

participants will also do self-study, interact with each other, learn by practicing, demonstrate their understanding of concepts through assignments, Flip Learning presentations and a term paper. In this course we will have two sessions each week.
